Trials and Triumphs of a Student-Run Free Pediatrics Clinic for Uninsured Patients

Shade Tree Pediatrics is an integrated primary care and psychiatry clinic for adolescents established in a student-run free clinic that serves uninsured patients in low-income families who may not otherwise get necessary care. We will share our successes and challenges with those interested in community health or health equity for underrepresented children and families. Our successes include providing comprehensive care to children ages 9 and above while addressing social barriers. The psychiatry arm of our clinic has highlighted systemic issues including insufficient access to culturally competent mental health services, and we are continuing to explore avenues to address the psychiatric counseling needs of uninsured adolescents in Nashville.

Advancing a More Inclusive Blood and Transplant System for Donors from Marginalized Groups

(3:15-4:30 am | Location: FXB G11)

This session focuses on the need for diverse donors across donation products, underrepresentation of racialized and LGBTQ+ donors across donor pools, unique barriers to donation impacting these groups, structural racism and discrimination in donation policy (past and present) which needs to be overcome, and solutions to advance a more inclusive blood and transplant system for donors from underserved/ historically excluded populations (focusing on how partnership with patient/family/donor/community advocates is critical to address disparities). The session will begin with a didactic component from the expert speaker (20 min), followed by facilitated small groups discussion of the issues highlighted in the presentation (35 min). Finally, the expert speaker will invite representatives of each breakout group to share a summary of their learnings for discussion with the larger group (25 min).

Migrant Health and Wellbeing: The Urgent Need for Collaboration and Solutions in Our Community

The ever-evolving migrant situation in Massachusetts is shining a spotlight on the fragmented and inequitable systems that prevent the most marginalized members of our population – whether homeless residents or newly arrived migrants – from accessing basic needs and addressing urgent health concerns. This session will focus on solutions, offering first-hand examples from the presenters that demonstrate the importance of cross-sector collaboration and how people can thrive and positively impact our community when provided with the resources needed to succeed.

Screening & Discussion: Birthing Justice

(1:00-3:00 pm | Location: FXB G13)

Birthing Justice: A Film by Monique N. Matthews. Black women in the United States are three to five times more likely to die from pregnancy-related complications than their white peers, a statistic that has actually gotten worse over the last 30 years. *Birthing Justice* captures the experiences and challenges of Black women, their families, caretakers and advocates, and examines the structures and systems that determine these disparate mortality rates.

The film addresses the myriad issues fueling the maternal health crisis within the African American community while advocating for best practices that enhance birthing equity for all women, especially Black women. This national epidemic is addressed via four regions — Washington, D.C., Augusta, GA, Missouri, and California — by speaking with those who have been affected by current policies as well as those who are at the forefront of advancing policy change. Through the telling of personal experiences a picture emerges of a systemic lack in the maternal healthcare based on race. To contextualize those deficiencies, the film also explores American medical history, revealing how the impacts of eugenics and a sweeping medical report called The Flexner Report continue to impact medical training for Black doctors and outcomes for Black patients over a century after they were conceived.

Through these stories, what emerges again and again as one of the chief solutions to Black maternal health is a diversified medical labor force, with surveys revealing persistent implicit biases across the field. The film also looks other ways that positive maternal and pregnancy outcomes are achieved for Black mothers, including incorporating and training doulas and in-hospital nurse-midwives, and pending congressional legislation. Transforming this narrative of tragedy into one of hope, *Birthing Justice* flips the victim-blaming paradigm by centering on the lived experiences of Black women and their advocates as they fix a broken system and transform the future, one birth at a time.
